Youth & Climate Resilience in Ethiopia

In Ethiopia, CDF Canada's co-operative model is equipping young farmers to face the challenges of a changing climate while building stronger futures for their communities. Through targeted training, 15,000 farming households have strengthened their skills in agricultural management and climate-smart techniques.













This investment is already producing results: 86% of farmers are now applying indigenous practices that conserve soil, protect water resources, and safeguard biodiversity.

For youth, these opportunities go beyond farming techniques. They provide pathways into cooperatives where leadership and decision-making are shared, and where young people can see a future rooted in sustainability rather than outmigration.

By combining climate resilience with youth empowerment, together we are helping ensure that new generations have both the skills and the organizational structures they need to sustain their livelihoods. These efforts demonstrate that cooperatives are not only vehicles for immediate adaptation but also long-term systems for resilience, inclusion, and hope.

Women's Mentorship Program: Breaking Barriers, Building Bridges



Evelyn Olunja was a seasoned co-operative professional from Kenya, when she joined the Women's Mentorship Program (WMP) in 2019. Like many women leaders, she faced systemic barriers: gender stereotyping, limited opportunities to rise into executive roles, and a lack of support.

Through WMP, she gained confidence in leadership abilities, honed strategic skills, and gained a global support network. These tools empowered her to rise to CEO of Kenya USA Diaspora SACCO in 2022. Evelyn

It didn't stop there, she carried the ethos of WMP forward by co-founding the Women in Co-op Society Kenya, mentoring over 111 women and advocating for inclusive governance across co-operative institutions.

Evelyn's journey exemplifies how mentorship can break down barriers, create space for women's voices, and foster generational change in communities.

Through her Women's Economic Empowerment (WEE) mandate in northern Ghana, VOICE for Women & Girls volunteer Lisa Vance worked with local credit unions and groups of Persons with Disabilities (PWDs) to strengthen business skills, financial literacy, and inclusive leadership. She carried out a needs assessment on the barriers faced by PWDs, delivered disability-inclusive Training-of-Trainers sessions, and helped create accessible learning environments tailored to mobility and literacy needs. Her support enabled PWD groups to develop action plans that reached hundreds of community members and informed new livelihood proposals aimed at expanding income opportunities and reducing stigma.

Lisa's contribution reflects the long-term, skills-based approach that defines VOICE. Rather than providing temporary support, volunteers equip partners with tools and co-operative practices that endure beyond each mandate. Their involvement also strengthens Canadian credit unions, as volunteers return with deeper leadership capacity, global awareness, and a stronger understanding of co-operative impact in practice.

Building Stronger Futures: IAAM Launches in 2025



After a full year of partnership-building, research, community engagement, and infrastructure development with our partners in Malawi, CDF Canada is moving into the implementation phase of our newest multi-year program: Integrating Aquaculture–Agriculture to Combat Food Insecurity in Malawi (IAAM). With its official launch in December 2025, IAAM brings together cooperatives, government partners, local producers, farmers, and their communities to strengthen climate-resilient food systems and expand sustainable livelihood opportunities in some of Malawi's most food-insecure regions.











At its core, IAAM supports communities to build stronger, more diversified agricultural and aquaculture practices, reinforces local co-operative structures, and ensures that women and youth can fully participate in emerging economic opportunities. The year ahead marks an exciting new chapter in CDF Canada's long-standing work in Malawi and our commitment to strengthening community-led, sustainable, and climate-resilient development. We look forward to sharing more about it with you.
